On 23rd May, the Family Medical Centre in Kirkby-in-Ashfield put on a health and wellbeing event to showcase services and support available to patients in the local area.

The day focussed on giving patients information and access to support services. These services and support groups can have a really positive impact in helping people to manage their health condition well. There were a wide range of services and groups present so patients could learn more about how they could

make a positive impact in managing their health condition and live well.

Patients had the opportunity to talk to; a specialist delivering DESMOND training (helping you to live well with diabetes), the diabetes specialist nurse, Diabetes UK, two specialist respiratory nurses, the heart failure nurse, the Stop Smoking team, Parkinson's UK and Ashfield Citizens Advice. In addition, Ashfield Voluntary Action promoted their Lifestyles project (a non-clinical service for people in Mansfield and Ashfield over 50 who are at risk of falls), the Step by Step project (for people with mental health difficulties) and their work with PPGs.

In total, 42 people attended the event. Services were showcased throughout the practice giving patients the chance to talk in comfort and privacy in a relaxed and welcoming environment. One patient commented that the day had been, 'very informative with plenty of opportunity to talk to people.'

This was very much a joint effort between Family Medical Centre and PPG (who were tireless in promoting the event) with flyers and posters being displayed in chemists, community centres, the library, GP surgery and on the local community bus. Family Medical Centre also sent out SMS messages to patients. In addition, the PPG leafleted cars in Morrison's car park on the day.

The presence of Ashfield Citizens Advice mobile information unit also drew people's attention being a popular local sight. As issues like debt, benefits and housing can have serious impact on people's wellbeing, it was an important part of the day.



The suicide support group provides private and confidential support for people in Mansfield and Ashfield who have experienced the loss of a loved one through suicide.

The group was founded in 2017 by Vicki and Kelly after the suicide of a close relative when they found that there was little support for families who had experienced suicide loss in Mansfield and Ashfield.

The support group meets once a week (Thursday 10.30 -11.30 am) at the Friends Meeting House on Rosemary Street, Mansfield and offers support and empathy in a confidential and friendly environment.

SSG also offers a support line which operates between 9 am and 3 pm from Monday to Friday.

All four volunteers; Vicki, Kelly, Emma and Laura are qualified Suicide Assist first aid support workers and can help with:

Grief Support

Loss Relationship difficulties

Bereavement Family Issues

Stress Understanding of suicide loss

Comfort Suicidal thoughts

PPG Networking Event - Support for your PPG

On Tuesday 5th June, to tie in with PPG awareness week, Mansfield and Ashfield CCG hosted an event to support patient groups at the Civic Quarter in Mansfield.

The event kicked off with a lively and informative presentation by Paul Devlin Chief Executive of the National Association of Patient Participation (NAPP). Paul began with an overview of the development of patient groups and their changing role. He then outlined the support NAPP could offer to PPGs and talked about the difference that PPGs can make in their community.

The presentation was followed by four workshops and each participant was invited to attend two of the four sessions.

The workshop in Zone 1 looked at PPGs with strong foundations. This session was lead by Julie McIntyre from Millview PPG and explored the way that effective



PPGs work in close partnership with their GP surgery and share good practice. The session also looked at the ways in which PPGs and GP surgeries can work together and establish the ground root foundations to set up a successful and proactive patient participation group.

Zone 2 addressed PPGs making a difference and improving patient experience. This session included looking at the primary care priorities of Clinical Commissioning Groups and how the patient experience can be improved based on need. The workshop also included presentations from Practice Manager, Nicola Ryan, and PPG Chair, Frank Ceney, at Forest Medical Practice who have worked together on a project to improve the patient experience around Dementia.





Zone 3 focussed on PPGS Improving
Health and Wellbeing and looked at the
work that is currently being implemented
very successfully across Mansfield and
Ashfield. This session was jointly hosted by
Keith Wallace who runs the Walking for
Health initiative across Mansfield and

Ashfield, Steve Wright, Chair of Brierley Park Medical Practice PPG and Lesley Watkins from Mansfield CVS.

The 'On your Doorstep' Walking for Health initiative is part of a national scheme run by the Ramblers Association and has excellent health benefits. The scheme is now being actively promoted by six Practices in Mansfield and Ashfield. Steve Wright, Chair of Brierley Park PPG talked about the work being done by their Practice and PPG to promote health and wellbeing as they have an excellent track-record in delivering well-attended and impactful health events. Lesley Watkins of Mansfield CVS talked about the importance of tying activities to health campaigns calendar and about the support Mansfield CVS

and Ashfield Voluntary Action can give to

your PPG.

Zone 4 was lead by Sarah Taylor of Ashfield Voluntary Action and centred on discussions about the steps PPGs could take to try to ensure that they were reflective of their local community with a view to sharing good practice and ideas.





In total 26 people attended the event and the feedback was excellent with some participants commenting that it was the best PPG networking event they'd been to. Event at Brierley Medical Practice

On the 5th April, staff at Brierley Park Medical Practice and the PPG put on an event to raise awareness around prostate cancer. The event began with a joint presentation by the North Notts Prostate Cancer Support Group and Macmillan on the symptoms of prostate cancer and the importance of early diagnosis.

Jo Gregg from Macmillan and Libby Clark from the North Notts Prostate Cancer Support Group (NNPCSG) also talked about the fact that men can be reluctant to take the first step when they have health concerns and the impact this can have on their long-term prognosis.

There was a second presentation from Jennifer Thompson from the Radiology Department at Nottingham City Hospital. Jennifer talked about radiotherapy treatment - dispelling some of the myths and misinformation on radiotherapy and talked about side effects and how developments in equipment technology mean that radiotherapy treatment can very accurately pinpoint treatment areas.

Attendance was excellent with 65 people coming along to the event. The Practice had identified patients who would particularly benefit from attending and had sent them an invitation via SMS. Consequently of the 65 attending 58 came as a direct response to this invitation. In addition to this, the Practice had circulated posters throughout the local community and placed an advert in the local newspaper, the Chad. Bob Clark from the NNPCSG also publicised the event widely on social media.

Steve Wright, Chair of Brierley Park Medical Centre; "... we were astounded by the number of people who came along - it was a really good turn-out and the presentations were very informative. I would like to think that someone attending on the day left with a much better understanding and hopefully any questions they had were answered and fears allayed. We had some excellent feedback and one patient actually took the time to write a letter of commendation to the Practice. As a direct result of the event, Sutton-in-Ashfield Rotary Club generously funded the purchase of a PA system so that future events will be even better. I would personally like to thank everyone for all their help and support in making this a fantastic event."

Lombard Medical Centre Patients Participation Group (PPG)

Patients at our Medical Centre may not be aware of the work of their PPG. The PPG meet monthly to provide constructive support to the Lombard Medical Centre (LMC) practice by providing a patient perspective to its decision making, planning and development. They may not also be aware that the PPG has a virtual group (VPG) and that members of the VPG maintain contact, receive agendas and minutes though the internet.

Fortunately the majority of registered patients do not attend the centre as they are well and so a PPG finds it difficult to contact those patients. This article is an attempt to bring to a wider audience of patients the work of Lombard Medical Centre PPG and VPG.

The issue of access to see a doctor or nurse is of great concern and is often reported in the media. The PPG were interested to see precisely the situation at Lombard Medical Centre and so the staff receiving telephone calls were asked to record the outcomes. They allocated callers to four categories; those who booked a face-to-face consultation, those who booked a telephone consultation, those not offered an appointment and those who declined an appointment. Initially the figures were a cause for concern, but during the last two years the number of patients failing to get an appointment has fallen to 10% or below. Clearly there may be short periods when access is reduced, due to the illness of a doctor or a sudden surge in demand which will effect access. However, by monitoring the access patients have on a regular basis, we have a clearer idea of the situation.

This year ASDA changed their signs in the car park to say that people could only park there if they were shopping in the store. This would adversely affect our patients who park in ASDA's car park, pay the fee, and attend the Medical Centre. In particular, patients with a disability would either have to park much further away or be unable to visit the Medical Centre. The PPG raised the issue with the District Council and they wrote to ASDA to remind them of the agreement they made when taking the site that the car park should be available to everyone. The PPG also contacted ASDA and a representative

from ASDA's Head Office attended one of our meetings. As a result of this, the signs were changed and patients continue to be able to park in ASDA's car park and visit the Medical Centre. In addition to this other issues became clear. These include concerns over staff safety on coming to the centre and leaving particularly on dark mornings and evenings and staff parking in ASDA's car park.

Each year the PPG identifies areas of interest/concern and prepares a survey to establish the views of a wider group of patients. The purpose of each survey is to inform patients of changes to the service provided and to find the views of patients on particular issues. Last year we looked at patient's use of repeat prescriptions and this year we have conducted a survey centred round data protection and the service provided by the practice for carers. Members of the PPG spend time giving out the questionnaires in the waiting room and discussing issues with patients. We are presently in the process of interpreting the results of the survey. When the results have been analysed members of the PPG meet the doctors and inform them of the findings. In the past this has gone on to form part of the annual plan for the Medical Centre.

Annual 'Flu' injection time provides the opportunity for members of the PPG to spend a few Saturday mornings in the waiting room discussing issues with patients. This enables members of the group to have a clearer idea of patient's views.

The PPG is a small group of patients and we would welcome new members.



Local launch of the Take a Seat campaign

Nottinghamshire County Council has launched the Take a Seat campaign in Mansfield and Broxtowe.



Take a Seat encourages local businesses to become more age-friendly and recognise the small steps they can take to make their space more welcoming, accessible and age-friendly.

Under the scheme, older people, and those with a disability or chronic illness are invited to take a break and have a sit down while they are out and about through the Take a Seat initiative.

Local shops who display the We are Age Friendly sticker will offer people the chance to sit down and a warm welcome.

The aim of the scheme is to tackle issues of social isolation and motivate older people to feel confident about leaving their homes and play an active part in their local communities. It does this by encouraging local businesses and community premises to join the campaign and offer people a chance to take a seat and 'catch their breath'.

Local businesses are welcome to join the Take a Seat initiative. Joining is free and includes an Age Friendly sticker to display in your premises and guidelines on how you can make your business age-friendly. Nottinghamshire County Council can also provide a limited number of businesses with a fold-a-way chair to offer customers if they do not have a suitable chair.

The scheme is currently being piloted in Mansfield and Broxtowe but it is hoped that the scheme will be extended throughout Nottinghamshire.
